

Trained manpower to tap the **Global Opportunity**

The Global toys market, valued at USD 156.5 Billion in 2021, is projected to reach a value of USD 249.6 Billion by 2027.

China is the major player accounting for nearly 60% of the global market.

India accounts for a mere 1.5% of the market.

Apart from the huge overseas potential, the Indian toy manufacturers have a huge opportunity in the domestic market, where China dominates accounting for almost 80% of the toys imported.

Skilled Manpower Supply is the Key



The Indian toy manufacturing industry is reportedly targeting a revenue of \$2-3 billion by the year 2024-25. Meeting such ambitious growth targets would require an ample supply of skilled manpower. The proposal to set up the AEQUS SKILL DEVELOPMENT CENTRE, KOPPAL is a step to meet the impending demand for trained personnel in the industry.

The AEQUS SKILL DEVELOPMENT CENTRE, KOPPAL will initially meet the requirements at India's first toy manufacturing cluster, the Koppal Toy Cluster.

By the time it is occupied completely, the 400 acres cluster, which will accommodate up to 100 manufacturing units, is projected to provide jobs to over 25,000.

The primary objective of the SDC is to provide broad-based multidisciplinary training relevant to toy manufacturing and programs for specialized technical skill upgrades tailored to specific industry needs. The curriculum and programs will be modeled on the lines of those run by the National Skill Development Corporation. The SDC will also impart programs for the development of non-technical skills to the workforce. It will also offer training to aspirants and specific industrynominated personnel on a need basis.

Seamless Integration withManufacturing Ecosystem


Situated a stone's throw from the Koppal Toy Cluster (KTC), the AEQUS SKILL DEVELOPMENT CENTRE, KOPPAL is ideally located to provide trained manpower to India's first toy cluster.

Spread over 400 acres, the KTC is designed to house an entire toy manufacturing ecosystem to support more than 100 industrial units. It is fully integrated with an SEZ, DTA, and FTWZ. It has been designed to global standards of infrastructure and facilities to support the entire manufacturing value chain.

The cluster will provide world-class manufacturing facilities with an atmosphere that is congenial to doing business, easing regulatory requirements, providing financial incentives, and affordable workforce and skilling initiatives.

The KTC complements the capabilities and infrastructure offered to the industry by the Belagavi Aerospace Cluster (BAC), and the Hubballi Consumer Durable Goods Cluster (HDC), all of which are situated in North Karnataka.

This infrastructure supports Aequs' focus on leveraging its manufacturing platforms which include capabilities across the industry verticals.

Support to revive

Kinnal Toys

In line with its overall resolve to train and create jobs for local youth, the AEQUS SKILL DEVELOPMENT CENTRE, KOPPAL has another social angle to its operations.

Kinnal toys, a relatively unknown and ancient Indian art form dating back to the 15th-16th centuries, come from a village called Kinhal in the Koppal district of Karnataka, India. The art form originated during the rule of the Vijaynagara Empire.

The wooden idols of Kinhal have been accorded a Geographical Indication (GI tag), recognizing the specific origin of Kinnal toys and the specific qualities they possess.

However, Kinnal toy making is considered a dying art with few wanting to take it up as an avocation. There are only 25 families in the Kinhal village still practicing the art.

Lack of financial support, adequate training and economic viability is the reason that the next generation of Kinnal artist families are looking for alternative avocations and are reluctant to carry on this centuries' old tradition.

The Aequs Foundation has taken up the initiative to revive the Kinnal art form by supporting original Chitragars, the traditional master craftsmen as they are known, to run long-term training at the AEQUS SKILL DEVELOPMENT CENTRE, KOPPAL for those interested in taking up making Kinnal toys.

These trainees will mainly comprise the local youth and people from the Chitragar community who want to hone their skills.

The Kinnal toy making course at the AEQUS SKILL DEVELOPMENT CENTRE, KOPPAL will be of three months duration for each batch.



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
